# **Loyalist Josiah Hart**

## Loyalist Settler in Guysborough County, Nova Scotia

In the Spring of 2022, I assisted Kyle Porpotage in obtaining his Loyalist Certificate for Josiah Hart. The following is a gatharing of information in obtaining this Loyalist Certificate.

Josiah Hart (born Feb 22, 1741) was the 5th son of Nathaniel Hart and Martha Lee.

Josiah Hart married Lydia Moss in Wallingford, New Haven, Connecticut on January 10, 1765.

**Josiah Hart** was a furniture and chair maker and sometime before the commencement of the war he had moved to Hartford and opened up a woodworking shop on his own behalf.

Once settled in Nova Scotia, **Josiah Hart** remained true to his beliefs, he was a staunch Congregationalist and was active in the community. He was seen as a public spirited citizen and a valued member of society.

It is believed that **Josiah Hart** died ca. 1828. And his wife, **Lydia**, died Dec 25, 1809.



As per book: **Guysborough Sketches and Other Essays by A.C. Jost**: In 1765, Benjamin Hallowell was given a grant of land in the eastern portion of Nova Scotia. This grant of land contained 20,000 acres which were located on the north side of Chedabucto Bay and along the eastern shore of Milford Haven, which is now known as Manchester. After the Revolutionary War the grant was settled by Loyalists. One deed was signed by 17 men but gave 18 men who were named on the grant a farm block of about 150 acres, five shillings and a set of terms to be followed. They were to pay six pence sterling rent per hundred acres yearly, they were to cultivate 3 acres per 100 and build a good framed house at least 12 x 16 feet with a good brick or stone chimney and to reside there with their families for 7 years. The second deed gives the same men a lot in town of Boylston which required a yearly rent of one barley corn and 2 Shillings Sterling.

The 18 settlers were: Mansfield Munson, Andrew Leet, Gideon Bryant, Willis Stillman, Aaron Andrews, Isaac Andrews, David Scranton, Matthew Hawley, Walter Munson, David Smith, Ira Atwater, Samuel Hull, William Atwater, Theophilus Yale, **Josiah Hart**, William Atwater Jr, Moses Hull, Ebenezer Merriman.

According to the Nova Scotia Archives, a list of names dated Oct 12, 1789, a 450 acreage was granted to **Josiah Hart** and family at Manchester, Guysborough County.



For the purpose of this Loyalist Certificate application, the lineage followed through son Jairus Hart.

Jairus Hart was born in Wallingford, New Haven, Connecticut on Feb 17, 1769 and moved to Nova Scotia with his parents and siblings after the Revolutionary War.

Jairus Hart married Frances Godfrey on Dec 31, 1795. The death of Jairus Hart is unknown and his widow married a Mr. Oates.

Lydia Hart married John Hadley on March 27, 1821.

The book: Guysborough Sketches and Other Essays lists John (born Aug 14, 1794) as the son of Joseph Hadley and 2nd wife Esther Atwater who married on Aug 9, 1791. She was the widow of one of the Connecticut Loyalists and she died Oct 14, 1807. Joseph Hadley died, at age 82, on Feb 26, 1838.

Proving that **Lydia Hart** was the **daughter of Jairus Hart** was a stumbling block till we found a deed which took place between **Sarah Hadley**, **Lydia Hadley** and **John G. Hart**. This deed noted that a said piece of land was granted to one **Jairus HART** and is claimed by the said **Sarah HADLEY** and **Lydia HADLEY** as heirs at Law of the said **Jairus HART** deceased.

Josiah Hadley (named as youngest son in Father's will)

**Frances Jane Hadley** was born Aug 11, 1827 and married **Thomas Hadley** (born May 17, 1820). **Thomas** was the son of **Joseph Godfrey Hadley** and **Judith Lawson**.

#### According to the 1871 Census, Thomas and Frances Hadley had the following children:

David Alfred Hadley (known as Alfred) married Susan Annie Grant.

### According to the 1891 Census, David and Susan Hadley had the following children:

**David Hadley** died Apr 8, 1917 of Heart failure due to an accident. The death certificate for **Susan Annie Hadley** states her birth as Sept 11, 1853, daughter of William Grant and Martha Church. **Susan** died on Dec 15, 1950, informant was son William.

Caroline "Carrie" Elizabeth Hadley married Norman MacDonald on July 3, 1911.

The marriage record gives her age as 21 and Norman was 37. He was employed as a miner in Glace Bay.

Norman MacDonald died on April 16, 1916 of stomach cancer.

Norman and Caroline had at least one child:

Ruby Grant MacDonald born Nov 26, 1911, in Glace Bay, Cape Breton Island, NS.

## Note of some interest:

Information by Ardella MacPhee,
It is believed these stones are for **Josiah Hart** and his **wife Lydia**.

Ardella bases the information on an article by John A. Morrison on the Harts, where he writes that Joshua (which is the same as Josiah) and his wife are buried in the old Myers Cemetery.

At the time of writing April 21, 1939, he states that "If you visit the little Myers burying ground in Manchester, you will find the modest tombstones erected to memory of Joshua Hart and wife and Charles Myers and wife, with one fencing around the four graves".
